Managing Pain

Please fill your prescriptions for pain medication and take the medicine as ordered by your doctor. Discomfort from your procedure is normal. Contact your doctor if:

You develop new or increasing pain

You have severe pain that is not relieved by medication

What else can you do if you develop pain at home? Other techniques to improve your comfort at home:

- Use ice packs for 20 minutes 3-4 times a day
- Change positions
- Support your incision when getting in and out of bed
- Try stress reducers such as deep breathing, music, humor and quiet visits from friends

Noticing Infection

Common signs and symptoms of infection are:

- Redness and severe pain around the area you had surgery
- Swelling in the area
- Drainage that is not clear
- Fever above 101°F using an oral thermometer

Stopping Bleeding

If you should develop excessive bleeding from your surgery site or area:

- Hold firm pressure for 10 minutes
- Notify your surgeon immediately if it does not stop

Managing Nausea

What can you do if you develop nausea at home?

- Try a cold compress to cool your forehead
- Avoid heat and humidity
- Certain scents have been known to help: essential oils like ginger or peppermint as well as rubbing alcohol
- Relax and try to sleep through the nausea period
- Eat bland, unspiced, lean foods that are gentle on your stomach. Examples include crackers, rice, toasted whole grain bread and chicken without the skin
